The birthstone for May is the **Emerald.** This makes sense, especially here in Maine where the trees, grass and flowers come alive and there is such a rich **greenness** all around! After the neutral gray/ brown drabness when the snow melts, the vivid color is nearly blinding in its intensity!



One of my favorite women religious is Hildegard of Bingen. A true Renaissance woman, BEFORE the Renaissance, Hildegard was a German Benedictine abbess, active as a writer, composer, philosopher, mystic, visionary, and as a medical writer and practitioner during the High Middle Ages. Aside from her poetry, knowledge of plants and herbs, her powerful spirituality is what draws me in. She famously wrote: "There is a power that has been since all eternity, and that force and potentiality is green!" Hildegard names this greening force viriditas, the Latin for her original "das Grün," the greening. With viriditas Hildegard captures the greening power, the living light that breathes in all beings, flows through all that is alive. Her teaching reminds us of our deep connection with the life force which sustains the cosmos and also every living being. Hildegard believed, "Viriditas is the natural driving force toward healing and wholeness, the vital power that sustains all life's greenness."

So, when we look around in the next few weeks, at all of the **green, lush abundance that surrounds us,** let us remember the healing and wholeness that God brings us – in the light of the resurrection of his Son, Jesus Christ.

"Those who trust in riches will be ruined, but a good person will be healthy like a **green** leaf." Proverbs 11:28

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The CCC Maine State meeting was held on April 6<sup>th</sup> at the N. Deering Congregational Church in Portland. Pat Weaver was 1 of 7 in attendance and submitted the following report of the day's activities.

We met at the church at 6:00 am on Saturday. There were seven of us ready to head out even with some sleet but the trip was good and everyone was excited, even with the early start and questionable weather.

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We arrived in Portland around 7:30 and was treated to a great breakfast, a mixer of fruit, eggs, sausage, juice and of course, plenty of coffee. I met with the Moderator Fred Fortier with a short meeting and then Doug Fogg, Youth Minister from Orrington, Vance, Vice Moderator, and another couple joined us. I had a very interesting and in-depth conversation with both Doug and Vance.

We then went upstairs to the Sanctuary; this is a beautiful church. We began with a worship service with song and praise. Mike Glidden, Pastor of North Deering, brought the word of God through a wonderful, inspiring message. We closed with communion and song. We then broke for a break and to stretch our legs. We went back to the Sanctuary for an interesting workshop called "What color are you?" It had to do with what kind of personality you are. We were introduced to Bill Diamond, former Maine State Senator and former Maine Secretary of State, who founded "Walk a mile in their shoes". This is a comprehensive study on foster care in Maine. Maine has the highest deaths of children in foster care than the whole of United States. The study deals with why and how this is happening and what needs to be done about this. One reason is lack of personnel to handle the case load, the rise in numbers of children in foster care. This is their Mission statement: "Our mission and purpose are the prevention of child homicides and the abuse of children who are under the supervision or care of the State of Maine or who are or have been associated with the child welfare system in any manner." There was such emotion during this session, especially when Melanie Blair, a biological, adoptive and foster parent, spoke of her experiences dealing with the government agencies. After this session we all broke for lunch, and what a lunch it was. Several different types of lasagna, salad and fresh bread, plenty of coffee and juice. Desert was cookies and ice cream. We went back to the Sanctuary to hear a talk on Substance Abuse by Leann Dodge, she did a couple of interacting demonstrations with the most interesting reasoning of why some get involved with drugs. She pointed out our generation had candy cigarettes and penny candy (the little round dots on a strip of paper). I see now that could be a beginning of how great it would be if they were real. It was something to think about!! She also pointed out what could cause someone to start taking drugs, this was very interesting and a lot to think about. 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## Congratulations

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James Lent, church member and part-time librarian here at SCCW recently earned his Eagle Scout rank.

Congratulations James, job well done! God bless you in all your future endeavors.

James Lent achieved the highest award in Scouting, the Eagle Scout rank, during a ceremony held in his honor at the Rockport Masonic Center on April 28.

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James, the son of Kenneth and Linda Lent of Rockport, finished his Scouting trail as a member of Troop 200 in Camden but he was also a member of Troop 206 in Rockland/Rockport and Troop 215 in Thomaston. Troop 200 Scoutmaster Ed Weber said, "We were very happy to be a part of James' Scouting journey."

Jeremiah Loft of Standish made the journey to present James with a candle lantern to guide his way and a tomahawk which is the traditional gifts given to those who attain Eagle Scout rank and were members of the Bushwack program at Camp Bomazeen. Scouts in the Bushcraft Program relive the adventurous time of exploration in the early 1800s, using a real forge to make tools like knives, shoot black-powder rifles, cook over a campfire and live camp life just as the pioneers did during the days before electricity and phones and automobiles. They stay in period clothing and build things like boats, lanterns, stools and baskets as did those who lived in those days. Every Scout who completed that program received a Bushcraft name. James' Bushcraft name is Wild Rover.

James passed his Eagle Scout Board of Review on Feb. 19 after completing his Eagle Scout Service Project which was completed last October. He built a diorama sign at Rockport's Marine Park to explain the historical significance of the narrow-gauge Vulcan steam engine. He started his project during the Covid pandemic which added to his challenges but he persevered. "I am pleased that after all that took place, I could get it done," he said. He completed the project for Legacy Rockport which the group and the town restored two years ago.

James is an active member of the Masons and provides assistance preparing meals for the organization.
