### PASTOR'S PAGE

What's not to love about the month of June? It's the month of graduations, weddings (most popular month!), Flag Day, Father's Day and the beginning of summer (solstice 21st) and June 7, National Chocolate Ice Cream Day.

We will be celebrating our community and town with Warren Days on 6/24 and 6/25. Come and join us for food, fun and community goodwill. We also have delegates from our church going to the National Association of Congregational Christian Churches in Wichita, Kansas at the end of June.

The warmer days, pleasant weather and the prolonged daylight (longest day is in June!) gives us all the opportunity to do more, see more, and plan more activities. It's as if along with the roses and other flowers opening, the world is opening up before us - inviting us, challenging us, beckoning us. In the same way, the Holy Spirit of God also invites us, challenges us and beckons us to come close, to lean in, gain understanding and wisdom, and to feel the flow of power and love within us.



# — Our Church History

Dissatisfaction, however, still prevailed and in 1790, three men, one from Thomaston, one from Waldoboro, and one from Union were shosen to fix upon a site. En June 23rd the Town voted that the new meeting house be erected on the land of William Boggs across the road to the west of the house. They sold the old meeting house for three pound, 6 shillings and chose committees to obtain funds by the sale of the ministerial and school lots. However, some legality prevented the carrying out this plan and nothing was done. In 1792 it was again voted to have preaching part of the time and to raise a tax of 100 pounds for building a meeting house. Later, a further sum of 22 pounds, 18 shillings was raised by selling the timber on the ministerial and school lets. Committees were again chosen to receive the materials and superintend the raising of the house which was new ordered to be located at the corner near Alex Bird's house. (Approximately where the Soldiers Monument now stands.) On January 14, 1793; it was voted that the meeting house be raised on Tuesday, October 8, and that a committee be appointed to settle the controversy arising between the "conservatives" who insisted on having the oldfashioned box pews, and the "modernists" who wanted the new style "slip pews."

The house itself was 49' x 40' with high gable end on the north and south and the pulpit on the eastern side with the entrance on the west. From this entrance, stairs led to a capacious gallery on three sides of the house.

Between the entrance and the pulpit were 2 rows of seven slip seats each on each side of the broad aisle; 5 slips and 2 free seats on each side of the pulpit and square pews on the other three walls. Nothing above, except the front gallery, was finished. The finished part being where the choir sat. The pews sold for \$25. for the highest to \$9 for the lowest. The right of choice set up to the highest bidders brought in the sum of \$333.50. The 100 pounds raised by the Town paid for the frame and proceeds from the sale of pews took care of all the other expenses. In April a contract was made with Alexander and William Lermond to find the necessary materials and finish the house outside and in, with the exception of the gallery pews, for \$1163.33. A committee was again asked to procure preaching for part of the time.


