

Celebrating 13 Years of the Children's Clothing Exchange

What began with just a few baby garments displayed on a small table in the upper room has flourished into a vibrant ministry. After a few months it grew and needed to be moved to the downstairs fellowship hall, where dedicated volunteers gathered every Saturday to set up, take down tables, and box up clothing all in one day. Their commitment was and still is truly commendable.

As the Clothes' Closet continued to grow, the Warren Baptist Church offered us a space when they acquired and renovated the Old Brick School. In 2017, we established our presence there as the Children's Clothing Exchange. We extend our heartfelt thanks to the Baptist Church for including us in this wonderful community space.

During Rev. Andy's time with us, he held a meeting with volunteers before our move to the brick school, asking each person about their vision for the ministry. One volunteer expressed a desire "...to have a JCPenney's." Interestingly, most of our clothing racks were purchased from JCPenney when they closed their doors. Today, our ministry remains as active as ever.

Susan Lombardo has generously and tirelessly overseen this initiative for many years. The Exchange is open every Thursday from 9 to 11 a.m., coinciding with the Food Pantry, and consistently welcomes ten or more visitors each week.

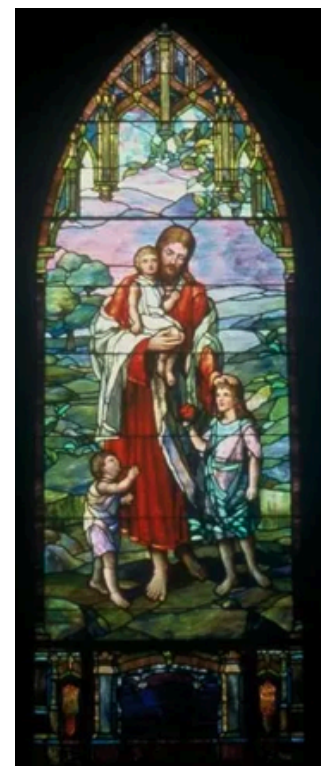

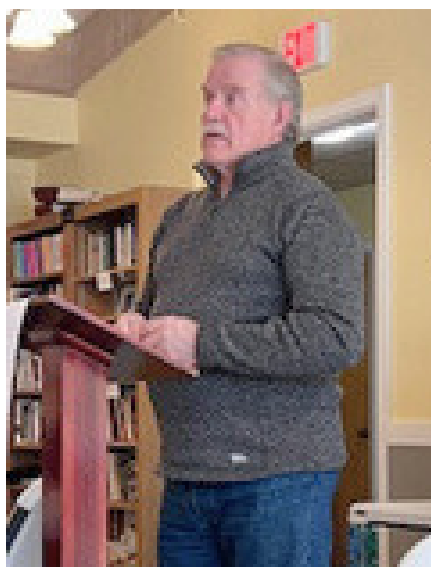


CCCMe State MEETING

The day began with breakfast and socializing, followed by a hymn sing in the sanctuary. We enjoyed a catered lunch before a business meeting where new officers were elected. Ending the event was a brief service with communion and beautiful organ music by Paster Peter Stickney from Newfield. The work of CCCMe in collaboration with the NA is commendable. Upcoming events include the NACCC annual meeting from June 27-30 in Springfield, Massachusetts, and the CCCMe Fall State meeting on October 17th at the Sebago Center. CCCMe Annual Spring Meeting
South Parish Congregational Church, Augusta Maine
April 25, 2026

The meeting started out with January and I arriving at the Church and meeting with Mark Tanner, Fred Fortier and Vance Jordan. Very soon the rest of our church walked in; Marcia, Sharon, Susan, Donna, Kathy, Gayle, Becky and Carolyn, as always we were the largest group there. The Executive committee of CCCMe put on the breakfast of donuts, muffins, fruit and breakfast pizza, plenty of coffee and juice.

After breakfast and fellowship with other member churches, we went into the beautiful sanctuary with very high ceilings and the most beautiful organ, high in the loft, that I have ever seen. The organist was Marcia Gallagher from the South Parish church.

Welcome was given by Rev. Mark Tanner of Skowhegan Federated Church. Rev. Doug Drown of Little Deer Isle Church also welcomed all then introduced Rev. Steve Richards from So. Parish church who had words of welcome and was happy to host our meeting and enjoy his church, he then proceeded to give a brief history of the church.

Rev. Fred Fortier of Sebago gave the opening prayer. Rev. Peter Stickney of Newfield gave an essay on how you should sing to the Lord God, with full voices, from the heart.

We then proceeded with a hymn sing. We sang and glorified God with several beautiful songs, one in particular that was written by Harry Emerson Fosdick (1878–1969), a prominent American pastor, wrote the hymn "God of Grace and God of Glory" in 1930 at his summer home in Boothbay Harbor, Maine. He wrote it for the opening of the Riverside Church in New York City. He said "When in Our Music, God is Glorified." Rev. Drown also spoke of Curtis Beach, (Cambridge, Massachusetts, February 9, 1914--February 23, 1993, Bangor, Maine). Comes from several generations of ministers, wrote "Praise to the Living God." He also said "Not to be afraid to live, love and die knowing God will be with you. Above all, sing Joyously."

We adjourned to the Fellowship where Rev. Tanner introduced Rev. Dr. Gerry Krupp, Executive Director of NACCC in Wisconsin. He spoke of the many resources that the NACCC has to offer, he also praised his staff, whom he couldn't do without, especially Laura Wright, she handles connections and provides lay minister training programs, Scholarships, and transportation with churches of the NACCC. Rev. Mark Tanner has also joined in this with her.

Rev. Peter Stickney spoke on how grateful he was that the NACCC helped him go the Minister Convocation in Chicago. How important it is for ministers to gather, relax and support each other, spoke on the beautiful Lady of the Lake Church.

Rev. Krupp also spoke of the rest of his staff and praised them all for their support, also the Congregationalist; which is one of the oldest periodicals in history. He spoke of the lapse or closing of 23 NACCC churches but he also spoke of the 77 potential churches coming to NACCC. He spoke of how we need to go into the community, knock on doors with care and content. He also spoke on the Plentiful Gifts Program, he told me that he is proud of my team at Rockland Congregational church and that other churches are looking up to us and what we are doing. I was so proud.

Peggy Griffin will be my new Mentor in place of Scott Chase who stepped down for personal reasons. The team will be joining a retreat at the NACCC Annual meeting in June.

Some of the observations Rev. Krupp made were;

- Churches with a big heart are experiencing growth by going into the community & reaching out.
- Churches need to speak God's word not social circumstances.
- Leading the church in Covenant and Mission statements.
- Finding the beginning of the churches vision.
- Communities need to have Congregational presence in the community.

state meeting PERSPECTIVE

On Saturday April 25th I attended the CCCME State meeting at the South Parish Congregational Church in Augusta. A highlight of the meeting for me was touring the Augusta Overnight Warming Center located in an annex of the Church. The church minister, Rev. Nathan Richards took us on the tour.

“People who are homeless are not social inadequates. They are people without homes”.

The warming center is open from Nov. 15th thru May 15th overnight from 5PM to 7AM. They have cots for 40 individuals. They provide showers, laundry, light food and onsite resources throughout the year.

*Quote from their website: “ ‘We love because He first loved us’ 1 John 4:10.
It is really that simple. We are called to love and care for those in need.
Everyone needs shelter and it is not our mission to judge who
deserves shelter and who does not.”*

Seeing the dormitory rooms with their lines of cots, for me, was a window into part of the life of the homeless. Privacy seemed to be a luxury. When people come into the shelter, they leave their things in individual lockers in the admission room. There is a fairly extensive check in process to go through. Individuals are allowed to spend the night if they are under the influence of any intoxicants. However, they are not allowed to use intoxicants while they are at the Shelter. They are not allowed to leave and come back inside once they are there for the night. Yes, they have had issues, there are three volunteers on duty overnight.

This church, in conjunction with other faith communities, also provides community meals every Saturday night.

“Our doors - and our hearts - are open. All are welcome”.

The church building is beautiful; the church family is truly inspiring.
